IT'S "ALL **CHANGE" ON THE BUSES**

After the latest consultations by Essex in respect of Passenger Transport it would seem that virtually all of the current serv-



ices provided under contract with ECC will stop and be replaced by DRT Services. That's Demand Responsive Transport Services to you and me. It looks likely therefore that the Friday 89B service will stop and we will become DRT3. As we understand it if you wish to use a bus you will need to call a number to arrange transport across our area. Groups can travel but only one person may well get a taxi turn up as opposed to a bus. Sounds like a pain but it seems the service will be available Monday to Saturday between fixed hours (8.00am to 6.00pm?) and not just

restricted to Friday mornings. The age concessionary pass will also be accepted. A meeting is being held on May 12th and we hope to have a parish councillor to attend and report back and have ordered leaflets giving details which will be distributed as soon as they arrive. We will keep you fully informed as soon as we know more.



Steeple Bumpstead Surgery April 2016

The Surgery has continued with the regular Locum Doctors attending each week. Dr C Bergh, Dr K Zada and Dr J Akhtar have now been regular faces for a year. Dr P Abe continues as cover. Dr Zada is currently on a lengthy leave period and a handful of days will be covered by a new Locum. Dr Zada is back mid-April.

Mel Cunningham continues to lead the nursing team. Chrissie Farrant, Practice Nurse, is concentrating on respiratory and diabetes management. The Health Care Assistant Lynnette Garstang continues at the Practice. Practice Nurse Christina Wilson has settled in well and now covers all absences for the Nursing staff.

There have been no working days where a Doctor or Nurse has not been present all day since Mid-June 2015.

Clinical

- The Surgery remains part of the Prime Ministers Challenge project. This means appointments can be made for Saturday morning at Saffron Walden or Dunmow for GP and Nursing services. These appointments can only be made by phoning or being present at Steeple Bumpstead Surgery.
- Dementia Accreditation The Surgery has made good progress on the programme to gain this award with the Alzheimer's Society. Initiatives such as amending the clinical IT system to alert of specific needs when appointments are being made and improved services for carers are examples of work completed. The Patient Participation Group are supporting this work and have also had the Alzheimer's Society attend their last meeting. The Practice Manager was asked to present the work that the Surgery was undertaking at a recent East of England conference.
- GP Shutdown days for West Essex are 20th April, 9th June and 13th July. This is on the Surgery Website and means the Surgery will be closed from 11.30am on these days. This happens nationally.

Dispensary

Noreen Metson and Jo Shurety continue to work tirelessly at the Surgery. Although only a quarter into 2016, they are on course to dispense and issue more than 40,000 items this year.

Support Staff

Rachel Mack our new Receptionist/Administrator has left and returned to her previous Surgery. This was a surprise. Lead Receptionist Emily Delicate has commenced looking for a replacement. Emily and Lesley Fergus, Receptionist, have increased their hours and we welcome Locum James Lofton who has excellent Reception experience and will assist the Surgery to fulfil opening times until we appoint a new Reception Administrator.

Your Help Please

The number of people who make appointments and then fail to attend is on the increase. This is frustrating for all of us. The Clinical Staff schedule their day around appointments, Reception are constantly juggling appointments trying to fit as many patients in as possible and people who have been told to call back or try another day are let down. This is because we would have been able to fit them in, If we had known an appointment booked was not being taken or cancelled. Many times where patients have tried to gain an appointment, we would have been able to fit them in.

We continue to work with the surgery to improve services for everyone. Gladman's proposed development

We have had discussion with the Surgery about the potential impact of the Gladman's proposed development on GP services. To date Gladman's has made no contact with either Provide or the Surgery itself. An additional 300 residents would represent a 12% increase on the current practice population. Villagers are already concerned about the difficulty in getting an urgent GP appointment and more patients will clearly increase the problem. There would need to be additional staff hours and there is also an issue about space as this is already at a premium.

The PPG will continue to liaise with both the Surgery and the Hands Off Steeple Bumpstead Group to ensure that the needs of the surgery are taken into account in the planning process.

Dispensary

The revised dispensary opening hours seem to be working well with no major problems. However, one of the ongoing issues for Noreen and Jo in the dispensary is that some patients on repeat prescriptions consistently fail to give the required 48 hours notice. In

one 3 week period this amounted to 53 patients. This meant that there were 53 times when staff had to abandon what they were doing to prioritise these patients above others that had given enough notice. If you need help remembering when to reorder your medicines please talk to Noreen or Jo and they will assist in whatever way they can. You may also be able to move onto the Managed Repeat Prescription Service. Also remember that if you have difficulty picking up your prescriptions from the surgery you can get a friend or relative to do this for you by agreement with staff.

Improving communications with patients

The PPG are launching a communications initiative with the aim of improving the speed of circulation of information about the Surgery and ensuring that as many patients as possible are keep up to date with what is going on. The intention is to create an email mailing list of registered patients of the Surgery. The PPG would have a nominated person to keep the list up to date and to send out relevant information. This could include staffing updates, emergency changes to opening hours and services available, reminders about GP shutdown days etc.

The list of participant's addresses would only be used for sending and receiving Mail related to the Surgery Services and no other use. It would not be shared with any other person or organisation apart from the nominated person and their cover for absence.

Patients can sign up to this new service via a form which is available from the Surgery Reception. Alternatively, email Liz Heyer and the form can be sent to you electronically. After completion put the form in the secure box at reception. New patients registering with the practice will be handed the form accordingly and patients leaving will prompt the Surgery to notify the nominated PPG member to remove that contact from the list. You can decide to unsubscribe at any time.
